Dr. Eva Wikberg is an Adjunct Professor in the Department of Anthropology at Tulane University and a co-director of the Boabeng-Fiema colobus monkey project. She is a molecular and behavioral ecologist who explores questions related to the evolution of primate sociality. In particular, she looks at cooperation within competitive societies in African colobus monkeys and Central American capuchin monkeys by combining long-term behavioral, demographic ecological, and genetic data. Her ongoing research investigates the effects of social strategies on the gut microbiome and individual fitness, with the ultimate goal of understanding the evolution of cooperative and competitive behaviors.
