Dr. Helina Woldekiros is a Postdoctoral Research Associate with the Department of Anthropology at Washington University in St. Louis. Her areas of specialization are subsistence and economic anthropology, bioarchaeology including zooarchaeology and human osteology, foodways, human–animal interactions, and African archaeology. Her work focuses on human adaptations in the Horn of Africa during the beginnings of food production, agricultural diets, pastoralism and mobile responses to climatic change in extreme ecological/environmental settings. She uses an integrated ethno-archaeological, GIS and archaeological approach and the concept of niche economies to discuss the subsistence and economic organization.
